Key Vocabulary

Continent	A huge area of land that is separated from others by water or other natural features. There are 7 altogether.
Equator	An imaginary circle around Earth. It divides Earth into two equal parts: the Northern Hemisphere and the Southern Hemisphere.
Physical features	Things that are natural e.g. seas, mountains and rivers. They would be here even if there were no people around.
Past	Something that happened or existed in a time before now (the present).
Present	Something that is happening now.
Future	Events or something that might happen in time to come.
Carnivore	Animals that eat other animals.
Herbivore	Animals that eat plants.
Omnivore	Animals that eat both plants and animals.


