And this is what I'm here to discuss-I have autism, which is fine. I want to take you to a world of mine. Autism varies so much, from person-to-person, but for me I strongly dislike touch Inside I'm wanting to escape, run away. So please don't touch me, I'm unable to say. Outside of my body I look as calm as a calm sea,

but inside I'm anxious, I'm worried and scared at School, in busy, noisy, crowded and Smelly places. Or when I am unprepared

for a change in my day, my routine. I want to excitedly flap my hands, but won't allow this to be seen

Or let you hear my constant humming. Humming helps me block out unwanted noises, noises you may not hear or don't bother you like the scribbling of a pencil, the lick of a clock, Why can't they just stop? Humming helps calm me through tricky situations, tough questions or maths multiplications. When people see me, instantly they think I'm fine. I'm not, I'm good at pretending. Believe me, hand dryers sound lite a jet engine! I only wear soft clothes, not ones my mum might have chose

When you tell a joke or say something funny, I might not always laugh, I don't have the ability because I don't understand the cue. When I feel ill I'm not always able to say, it tates someone else to see that I'm not ok! I watch the same films over and over, Say the same things, talk about my interests for what seems like forever Soft toys and fidget toys give me a lot of comfort and pleasure! I need calmness, relaxed and quiet places, I don't like people crowding my spaces. I can't sit down for too long at my dest, I have to get up, go for a walk, a spin or take a rest. But Autism doesn't just affect me. Millions of others in our world are autistic too. Even some famous people are able to relate to meyou know that guy Lionel Messi, The man Timothy Burton who gave us the show Wednesday the Ghostbuster who's name is Ray and even that genius called Albert Einstein they all have autism just like me and that's fine!

As part of Autism Awareness Week, Hudson in Year 5 has written a superb poem about Autism and his experiences.



- Creating our own magnetic board game in science




What learning have we been completing in Meerkat class?

Are you missing benefits that are available to you?

You can get £100 and free school dinners for your children!

If you are eligible and sign up, you will be able to access both. "My child already gets free dinners in KS1," you might say, but they won't in KS2 unless you sign up for this. Once 'signed up' you will have access to a one off fund of £100 to use during the time that your child is at St Chad's. This £100 can be used for a range of things school based, including

- Trips during school time or after school where a donation is asked for by the school,
- School camp,
- Payment of after / before school clubs,
- Any activity in school where a donation is asked for, such as a visitor to the class-room,
- School uniform to be purchased from Monkhouse or Linela where we have negotiated a payment procedure and where you are able to purchase logoed items.

If you want more information, please go to https://www.gov.uk/apply-free-school-meals. It is an anonymous application; it does not come to the school but to the local authority and, once accepted, the benefits are yours. The purpose of the fund is to support academic development, hence the list, and school -of course- will not hold cash on site, so rather a running tally of spends will be kept. We hope that this will both help the school further provide great education and also support eligible families with the ongoing demands of having a child in school.
